About Last Meeting ...

Jamie Cox opened the meeting at 7:05pm with 16 persons present.

Jamie dove right into his presentation on using Sherlock to do plain English searches of a topic online. Jamie also showed how to add additional search plug-ins into Sherlock to expand its search abilities.

Some time was also given to utilizing some of the major online search engines such as AltaVista, Yahoo, and Google. Using these search engines online, Jamie showed how to use the quote marks for keeping searches confined and also on how to use Boolean searches that contain AND, OR, and NOT.

Web Intro - Boolean Searches

There are lots of great search engines on the World Wide Web. Chances are that you will need to use them at some point. Some of these search engines allow Boolean searches. These are searches that allow you to combine search terms. This enables you to more tightly focus your search and get the most useful and effective results.

Boolean words are: AND, OR, and NOT.

When using AND, you are asking only for results that match BOTH search terms. For example, if you were looking for information on the Great Depression, a search on the term depression alone would likely give you numerous hits on the clinical state of depression rather than the historic period. By combining the terms "great" and "depression" your search excludes any source that doesn't contain both terms together. You are more likely to get hits with the kind of historic information you're looking for.

When using OR, you are asking for results that contain EITHER search concept. This will help to increase the number of search results that are produced. This is useful if you are not sure which specific term will yield the sources you are looking for

NOT isn't used very often. It severely limits the number of search results produced. However, it can be useful because it allows you to tell the search engine to search FOR one item, but reject anything that contains the other item (the item following the word NOT). As an example, supposing you wanted to search on the term alcoholic but did not want any results with the word anonymous. You would construct your search as "alcoholic not anonymous."

Some search engines on the World Wide Web allow you to simply type in the Boolean words while others have options that you can select to identify which Boolean term you want to use.

Jamie concluded his presentation about 8:25pm. Dinner site voted on was Bennigan's. Meeting adjourned at 8:30pm.









Recently on TechTV (09/21/01)(local cable channel 150 7-8:30pm) an Adobe

Photoshop® expert and digital artist gave a short demonstration on using Adobe Photoshop® 6 on a Mac (of course). Below are listed the instructions on making your own antique photo.

Make your new photo an antique

1. Choose a picture you want to antique.

2. Select the entire image (Select > All) and send it to its own layer (Layer > New > Layer Via Cut). 3.Increase the canvas a bit (Image > Canvas Size) to give yourself about a quarter of an inch on the edges, which you will need later.

4. Select the layer that contains the image and go to the Hue/Saturation control (Image > Adjust > Hue/Saturation).

5. Choose Colorize at the bottom right of the dialog box. This will turn the image into a single hue. To give the image a sepia tone, make the Hue setting about 40 and the Saturation about 30.

6. Scan an old photograph that has a lot of damage such as tears and scratches.

7. Convert the scan to grayscale (Image > Mode > Grayscale).

8. Go to the Levels command (Image > Adjust > Levels).

9. Push the darks (left arrow) and the midtones (center arrow) toward the right to drop out all the details of the photo, leaving the light-colored scratches visible.

10. Using the Move tool, drag the image with the damage onto the first image. This will place it in its own layer, which we will call the damage layer.

11.Place the damage layer in Screen mode (Mode setting in the Layer's palette). This will make the scratches appear as if they were on the image.

12.Merge the damage layer with the image layer.

13. With the Lasso tool, make a rough selection where you would like the image to appear torn. Send it to its own layer (Layer > New > Layer Via Cut).

14. Rotate the layer with the tear slightly and move it away from the rest of the image.

15. In a new layer, select a rectangular shape to resemble a piece of tape and fill it with white. Put that layer in screen mode and reduce the opacity so that it looks like tape.





Genuine Fractals 2.0


Genuine fractals 2.0 is an RGB image encoding and rendering plugin. It works with Adobe Photoshop, PhotoDeluxe, Corel's PhotoPaint, and many other graphic programs.

It allows you to save large format print images at much smaller file sizes. It also saves time by working in medium-sized original files for high-resolution output.



The first window you see offers you an option of saving lossless or visually lossless

It allows encoding small files from a screen resolution images for web display. **Example:** you scan a 15 to 25 MB RGB file for any size output. Example: scan a 4 by five transparency at 600 dpi to produce a 20 MB RGB file. Edit your photo in your image edit program (i.e. Photoshop, etc.).



This window allows you to save your images for the web at reduced file sizes.

Then encode the image with Genuine Fractals . Your file size will generally be two to 5 MB. When you need to output the image at 450 MB or 60 MB, or any resolution you like; you can generate any resolution from the same encoded file.

This saves you lot's of storage on your hard drive!

For an experiment, I took a digital 1.9 mega pixel image, stored it at it's original size, 85.1 MB, saved it down to 22.9 MB lossless, 3.8 MB visually lossless and you really

couldn't tell by the naked eye what info it took out.

Most of the image that was sharp to begin with retained its sharpness, some of the areas less focused remained that way but there were details that popped out and were visually pleasing.

For smaller quality printing you can encode 4-5 MB originals to less than 1 MB and output a 20 MB file! You can even save smaller files for the Web as low as 10 through 150 K! You can save any Photoshop

file format in Genuine Fractals!


There are two file formats genuine fractals allows you to save in. S T N , lossless- encode 's mathematically , resolution independent. So you can scale image up to any size resolution. Genuine Fractals claims that you can go up to Billboard size- I'm very curious to see this , because of course it is beyond my printer capabilities. FIF , allows you to save files visually lossless for Web Graphics in various quality settings .


Using the actions palate in Photoshop four or later, you can create a batch that automatically processes STN or FIF files from images created in the folder you designate. You can also crop files while keeping your original intact. You can manipulate pictures in a variety of ways without ruining your original image.

There are many other features such as, the ability to scale, the ability to open the file in another color, and the ability to use ICC profiles with Photoshop 5.

This program, is well worth it's price and retail starts at \$129.

This window allows you to crop your image while leaving your original intact. It also allows you to modify your photo to multiple desired sizes without loosing integrity of your original image. You also are allowed to change resolution and scale in this window.


