

OS X REVIEW Ready & Rolling...OS X (it's a "10" not "ex") by Mark Fosgate, Club Secretary

I've been able to use MS Word/Excel 2001, Quicken 2000, and PhotoShop 6 with no problems in Mac OS X. Because of the stability of OS X, I can leave running, hidden in the background, all of my routine apps, like Internet Explorer (IE), Entourage, Fire, Sherlock, QuickTime 5, and many others, including the Classic environment of Mac OS 9. When I need to switch apps, I just CMD-TAB till I get the one I want or go down to the Dock (hidden also) and select the app I want, and I'm instantly ready to go. No more waiting for an application to start up. When the machine goes to sleep, I just touch the keyboard and it's instantly

For those of you that have missed screensavers, Apple now includes several to select from and third party developers are providing a lot. So far, all have been free. More are coming and you can count on the really cool ones down the road to have a small fee attached. Another thing you can do now is set a different background for folders that you open as well as for the desktop.

The Dock can hold an almost unlimited amount of applications within its framework. Your initial settings will determine how much shrinkage the Dock will go through as you add more apps to it. I currently have 34 items in my Dock, grouped by the way I use things (like Internet apps, text apps, graphics apps, etc.). When you add items to the Dock, all you are adding is an alias to the application, although there's no clear indication that it's an alias (a probable near future change).

For those concerned with security, Mac OS X has a builtin firewall (ipfw) that can be accessed through a terminal window (you have to know where to look). Or you can use a \$25 shareware utility called Mark

Brickhouse (look on the

www.versiontracker.com search site) that gives you easy-touse access to the firewall functions. The author has even made available groups of presets that you can import and save, for average home use all the way up to using your computer as a hosting device. Other shareware firewall access programs and commercial firewalls are available or being finalized. You can also use hardware routers.

For the seasoned Unix user, Mac OS X comes with an additional CD called Developers Tools to enhance the OS and develop applications, plus the terminal window provides Unix command line interface. For those that like the X Windows environment, Tenon and others have released tools to run X Windows apps from the Mac GUI. So people that like or need GIMP (an opensoftware program much like Photoshop) can run up to version 1.2 now.

Everyday, there are more applications, utilities, and games released to run native under Mac OS X. And hold on

What do I think of Apple's latest entry level PC [the new iMac]? Good marks for adjustable screen, great support for Firewire, video, and wireless devices, and having a DVD-ROM/CD-RW burner as part of the base configuration. None of



the new iMac configurations are shipping and the entry level won't be for months. And then there's speed and price...you can get a great web surfer/general use machine for less money by going with an x86 commodity PC running Linux (Windoze never recommended). But for unique styling and specific features, you might want the iMac.

There are some things that Mac OS X doesn't support yet, like my Handspring PDA (although Palm just released a Preview Beta of their software). But when I absolutely need to sync my PDA, I can boot into Mac OS 9 and do so from there. My OS of choice now is Mac OS X, with Mac OS 9 running on top for the times that I need

Dinner site voted on was Bennigan's. The meeting was adjourned at 8:40pm.

Photoshop (demo'd at the San Francisco Macworld Expo; estimated release date 2nd quarter 2002). Other things will come soon. As of this writing, OS X version 10.1.2 has been released. You can now burn CDs and watch DVD movies (very well, I might add) and if you have a superdrive (the DVD burner/CD-RW burner combo drive in the highend Macs, including the new iMac G4 800), you can create your own home/business movies or slide shows for use on a regular DVD home player. Roxio (makers of Toast for Macs) recently released an update to their software, so now you have two ways of making CD-Rs: Apple's and Roxio's.

Apple is upping the ante with their own new apps and PC users are converting because they see how easy the Mac makes video editing (iMovie2 & Final Cut Pro 3), digital image cataloguing and editing (iPhoto), and music cataloguing (iTunes2 & the new iPod). Database management is supported by FileMaker Pro 5.5. There are now over 2,500 Mac OS X native applications out there and more being announced daily. Stay abreast of releases & updates with www.versiontracker.com.

Apple specifies a minimum of 128MB of RAM to run Mac OS X and Mac OS 9.2.2 together. This is a bare minimum. I recommend upgrading to as much memory as you can afford, within reason. I have 384MB of RAM installed in my 333 iMac. All new shipping Macs will support 1GB of RAM or more.

Rumors are that Version 10.2 is coming soon. Things can only get better as Apple releases additional updates to this exciting new era in Apple's history.
