It's interesting to see how the use of the various operating system versions has developed within the group. There are still many using one of the OS 8 ver-



Jim asked about doing a Christmas party this year and no consensus was made.

Jamie Cox was introduced as the guest speaker for the evening on the subject of iPhoto.

Jamie started off by taking several pictures of the group as a means for showing the import of pictures from a digital camera and explaining how the process works. Jamie showed how to adjust the sizes of photos, how to search, how to create and apply keywords, and do simple edits of pictures. Jamie also showed the different functions that are available in the pro-

grams Share function. Additionally, Jamie showed how Image Capture could be used in Mac OS X.

Jamie switched into OS 9 to show how the software that came with his digital camera could be used to do a Panorama file ^(3)stitching^(2) the three pictures of the group present into one continuous panorama picture. Not all digital camera companies provide this type of software; so if this is important to you, look before you buy. Otherwise you'll have to pay out of pocket for this capability.

HOT TIP!

A **problem** that occurred in 10.0.x has come back. Any mountable volume (disk image, CD, etc.) inserted into the 10.1.5 G4 533 MHz shows up as unreadable. I found an Apple support doc for 10.0.x giving the correct hostconfig document corrections.

http://docs.info.apple.com/article.html?artnum=106345 However this info is outdated. I tried just adding the AUTODISKMOUNT line to my hostconfig file, but this didn't work. Then I tried comparing the hostconfig file from a working system to this one, and found it was also missing AUTO-CONFIG=-YES-. However even with these edits the machine refuses to mount external media.

Solution on the **Macfixit** forums.

It calls for a real Homer head-slap - DOH! I guess for security's sake I deleted the "unknown" group from Netinfo. This group must exist in order to mount external media, including disk images, as I discovered. Oh well, so much for thinking I knew what I was doing and being nice and secure. I was able to put Humpty back together again by looking at the settings on a nearby machine that works and copying them from that Netinfo.

I wonder why Apple hasn't posted this in their knowledge-base yet.

Just in case any of you run into this - another possible "gotcha" is that you must save your changes in Netinfo before deauthenticating, or it will nicely tell you that all your changes are being lost with no chance of saving them. Not a huge deal to reproduce the changes, but it's getting late and I'm tired.

iListen Makes Dictation Easy

A review by Cher Daley:



The control window allows you to change modes, turn the mic on and off and check spelling.

System requirements: G3 or **G4** Power Macintosh Computer Mac OS 9.2.2 and 192 MB of RAM Mac OS X.1.5 or higher and 256 MB of RAM. ACD-ROM player.

MacSpeech is a Mac-only company, with software developers who have been creating speech recognition software for many years.iListen TM , MacSpeech's first dictation product, is speaker dependent voice recognition software, based on a proprietary implemen-tation of the Philips FreeSpeech speech engine from Philips Speech Processing.

iListenTM1.5.1, created by MacSpeech is an easy to use dictation, editing, transcription, and speech navigation application. Whereas its competitor IBM ViaVoice; only works in certain programs, iListenTM works in almost every application including e-mail apps. A good example of this is the program I'm working in now, Quark Xpress, I used to have to cut and paste copy from one application to another. Now I don't have to do this because ilisten works in Quark!

You also are able to use the digital voice recorder to time-record now and transcribe later. iListen will record from your WAV and AIFF audio files.

ilisten™ features include:

- Direct dictation into any application
- Correct in any application
- Learns new words easily
- Transcription support generate text from audio files

- Speech navigation open, close,

iListenTM is easily scriptable with Applescript, and if you're using keyboard commands iListenTM has included TypeKey helper 1.2. a third-party application that enables you to write scripts for key commands such as

copy and paste (command C) and (command V), or close window (command W). The possibilities are endless. It even gives you a quick start guide to get you started (for those of you we don't want to read the manual, and you know you are).

Another thing I liked about iListen™ is you don't have to use a headset to speak into the Mac. You can use a PlainTalk microphone, a USB microphone, or it will work with many headphone sets. This is particularly useful when you only have one arm to work with. Not only can you speak and have iListenTM type for you, you don't have the hassle with fitting headphones around your head! I mainly use my power book, you know the one, the G4 titanium and I am speaking approximately a foot and a half away from it. I'm only using the built-in microphone!

I also tested iListen with the Andrea NC-7100, USB headset that I had previously purchased. both worked well, but I prefer not to struggle with the headset. other microphones available are:

PlainTalk microphones: Andrea NC-71 Mono VXI iParrott Mono VXI iParrott Stereo

USB microphones: Andrea NC-7100 VXI Jamaica Mono Telex H-841

If you already have a microphone that isn't on the list, don't worry; chances are it will work. iListen's Set Up My Microphone assistant should adjust the levels of most

microphones to work with your system. Naturally, if you bought your microphone from MacSpeech along with iListen™, you can be sure it will work with the software.

See the MacSpeech Web site at www.macspeech.com for up-to-date information on supported microphones.

You can also use the Griffin Technologies (www.griffintechnology.com) iMic USB to Audio microphone adapter to convert an analog headset to one that will work with USB systems.

iListenTM cooperates with Apple Speakable Items so you can do things like open applications, save files, close Windows, or just about

your Mac to do.

iListen™ is exclusively written for the Mac unlike VIA Voice which is ported from the PC side. Therefore, I believe this makes it much easier and smoother for installation and training your voice.

The program has capabilities of training several profiles so more than one person will be able to use it on the same computer. A profile is iListen's record of your voice model, along with details regarding your headset and the amount of background noise it heard while setting things up for you.

Beside dictating text, you can also use $iListen^{TM}$ to control your Mac without using the mouse or keyboard. iListenTM allows you to use speech as a "third hand." Speaking to your computer can be faster and can help you accomplish tasks more easily than constantly moving your hands from keyboard to mouse.

iListenTM has an extensive command vocabulary and "what can I say" window. What Can I Say

anything that you can command Window gives you a running list of the commands that are available for you to speak at any given time.



Because what you can do with iListen™ will vary depending on what's happening on your screen, you will see different commands appear in this window as the context for those commands changes.

iListen $^{\!\scriptscriptstyle TM}$ has three modes it $\bar{o}per$ ates in: dictation, command, & spell. You will probably use the dictation mode the most. There are three ways to switch modes: speech, menu, and with a customizable keyboard shortcut that you will find in the iListen™ applica-

All around, I would recommend this application for any MacUser. It is about the same price as VIA Voice and seems to operate much smoother. It will require some training, but the more you use it, the more it will recognize your style of speech.


